Isibani remains as busy as ever but there is a real sense that we are heading in the right direction. Sboniso, our operational manager, is doing very well and is handling a lot of the day to day centre based services.

Creche and baby day care

The crèche is off to a flying start in 2012 ... there are almost 90 children attending and a further 11 in baby day care.

We have big plans for the crèche this year, all children aged 3 and above were assessed at the start of the first term and will be re-assessed at the end of each term throughout the year so we can monitor their improvement and identify any children who are not keeping up with the rest of the class.

We are also hoping to bring in medical professionals to review the children; we will test hearing and eyesight as well as having an occupational therapist, speech therapist, dentist and dietician visiting throughout the year.

There are 5 classes at the crèche and children are taught in both English and Zulu. There is one to one support for any children falling behind.

Most of this has been possible thanks to a YWAM volunteer from Zimbabwe called Ray. He has past teaching experience and has chosen to stay on in South Africa to work on this programme with us, we are very happy to have him.

We have a short term volunteer from Germany, Eliza, who has started dance classes in the old baby day care building in Khetani, so far so good!

Flora and Sandra, our 2 German volunteers, are doing very well and working on lots of youth and children's projects.

Mma Zinhle has joined the health team and has worked with Sindi over the past few months learning about HIV testing, adherence training, first aid and much much more. Now Sindi has left Christine has stepped in and is working with Zinhle a few hours each week.

Sandele, Sylvester and MaNxumalo are still with us and are all doing well. After around 4 years of trying MaNxumalo finally has her ID book, yippee!! This means she can access grants for her 3 children and for the first time in many years will be able to support herself and her family.

Special Classes

Flora, Christine, Nokuthula and other volunteers are continuing their work with Celimfundo primary school. Three mornings a week they take a group of around 25 children out of grades 1 to 3 to attend special classes. They started by screening 80 children who were not coping well in the mainstream school and selected the most needy for their special class.

In these classes the children are being taught in both English and Zulu and are learning basic skills such as counting, reading and writing. In the short time this programme has been running the volunteers have seen huge improvements in the children, they are more confident, eager to learn and are much better behaved when they return to their regular classes.

We are using a curriculum donated by an overseas volunteer and the programme has been very successful so far. Our vision is to have a dedicated building in the grounds of the primary school but we are thankful to KCF for allowing us use of their church in the meantime.

Special Needs and Cerebral Palsy

During 2011 we witnessed many miracles both in our special needs and cerebral palsy groups.

We have a patient who was left unable to walk or even stand after having TB of the spine, we started with exercises whilst he was still bed bound and he turned into our star pupil. If he was asked to do 5 repetitions he would do 10! He came to the centre regularly for sessions and his hard work has paid off, he is now walking with just one walking stick.

We are blessed to know a little girl with CP whom we first met a few years ago, she also wasn't able to stand or even to sit up straight, her limbs were very contorted. She has improved beyond belief and in our last session of 2011 was able to walk without any help.

If things continue like this we will need to start fundraising for tissues for these sessions!!

We are thankful to NG Kerk, Winterton for sponsoring these programmes with food and to Surina our CP therapist and Emmaus hospital for running the special needs clinic.





Clinic Days

The mobile clinic visits twice each month and can see over 250 patients in one day. With thanks to the dedication of Jill Atkinson and the generosity of Desai Supermarket we are now able to provide food and drinks to these patients as they wait for their consultation.

Jill is desperate for volunteers to help her in the kitchen on these days; if we don't find her volunteers soon we fear she will be needing the clinic herself! We are also grateful to two local nurses who offer their expertise regularly on clinic days.

Isibani continue to offer our support to clinic staff and now hand out all the chronic medication. We are a victim of our own success as many more patients are choosing to collect from our clinic now, we have over 400 patients registered on our database.

We also help the nursing staff by taking blood pressures, blood sugar, weighing patients, assisting with HIV testing and screening for TB.

With thanks to a local volunteer carpenter we have turned one of our larger rooms into 3 separate consulting rooms. This was made possible only through a donation from Saint-Gobain Rigips GmbH, S.-G. Gyproc (PTY) Ltd. und DHL.

tend to have a negative impact from an early age on.

At the time of the soccer world championship in 2010 Saint-Gobain Rigips in Düsseldorf already showed interest in donating building material to South Africa. Spontaneously, their collegues in South Africa and DHL decided to support them. In October 2011, 800 plaster boards and 216 bags of body filler were donated to the Isibani Community Center in South Africa. With the help of volunteers the material will be used to build new HIV-testing and counselling rooms at the center. Furthermore, a community facility will be built in Khetani to offer various activities to approximately 11000 people (i.e. soccer, music groups, gymnasium, drama groups, holiday clubs, movie nights etc.). Hence, especially the young people will have a place to learn in a secure and friendly environment.

Matthew 25

We have had good results with Matthew 25 and have recently assisted another few ladies to get ID books and hence be able to access grants.

We have around 120 people collecting food each month for their family, they receive a meal on the day as well as spending some time volunteering at the centre in the garden, the kitchen, collecting leaves or cleaning windows.

Garden

The garden is looking incredible thanks to the hard work of a local volunteer, we are using the food grown to supply the Isibani kitchen and are also able to regularly bless our Matthew 25 and home based care clients with fresh produce.

Charity Shop

Despite Rosie's departure the shop is still running and Sandra, one of our German volunteers, has taken over responsibility for this now.

Isiphephelo

We have identified a site for the place of safety that we plan to open, we have appointed a project manager and hope to have the centre open by the middle of the year. It will provide accommodation for vulnerable, orphaned and abused children whilst their case is investigated and a longer term solution found for them.

The site will be in Emmaus, close to the hospital and the local schools. The programme will not just be about accommodation but will provide holistic physical and emotional care for these children both during their stay with us and after their subsequent placement.

This is a huge project and Isibani is working in partnership with Morester Childrens Home in Ladysmith as well as Philakahle in Bergville.

Holiday Club

Over the Christmas holiday a team of volunteers got together and organized a four day holiday programme for primary school children. We had up to 130 children attending each day and they took part in up to 4 different activities throughout the day. They tried their hand at drumming (we had a volunteer drummer from YWAM taking these sessions), they baked cookies, had an art and craft session and then structured games.

All children rotated through the 4 activities in the day and also had lots of breaks for food, drinks and free play.

On the afternoon of the fourth day the children performed in their groups in a talent show. The highlight of which for me was a little nativity sketch with the very small children. Mary told Joseph she was going to have a baby and 3 year old Joseph replied "Eish"!!





Boys Camp

Last year Philakahle, an NPO in Bergville, organized a girls camp. We are now working in partnership with them to organize a boys camp which will take place

during the Easter holidays. A group of 30 boys will be selected from local schools, they are first asked to write a motivational essay which we use as a basis of selection.

The boys will go to Greystones Camp where they will stay for 5 days and 4 nights, the programme will be focused around life skills, healthy relationships, peer pressure and the power in each of them to make choices. We want to empower these boys to become young men who will support their families, make no excuses for unprotected sex and say no to domestic violence on any level.

After the camp support groups will be set up ensuring the lessons learnt on the camp

stay fresh and new.



The girls camp had incredible results and we hope to be able to run a girls camp and a boys camp each year.

We are looking for sponsorship for this boys camp; the cost of sending one boy to the camp will be R900. All sponsors will receive feedback from the

camp organizers as well as a personal reflection from the boy they have sponsored. Part sponsorship is also possible, any donations will be greatly received.
